

Introduction

The Great Fifty Days of Eastertide form a single festival period in which the tone of joy created on Easter Day is sustained through the following seven weeks, and the Church celebrates the gloriously risen Christ:
Triumphant in his glory now, his sceptre ruleth all, earth, heaven and hell before him bow, and at his footstool fall. (Fulbert of Chartres)

Opening Response

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you

And also with you

This is the day that the Lord has made

Let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Here are words you may trust.

Remember Jesus Christ, risen from the dead: he is our salvation, our eternal glory. If we die with him, we shall live with him; if we endure, we shall reign with him. If we deny him, he will deny us; if we are faithless, he keeps faith. For he has broken the power of death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. *cf 2 Timothy 2.11-13*

Confession

Christ died to sin once for all, and now he lives to God.

Let us renew our resolve to have done with all that is evil and confess our sins in penitence and faith. *cf Romans 6.10*

Let us begin by reflecting on the week that has just passed:

Thank God for all the blessings you have received.

Consider the things which we have done, or not done, or even our thoughts which we now wish to say sorry to God for:

Let us then return to the Lord our God and say to him:

Father, we have sinned against heaven and against you. We are not worthy to be called your children. We turn to you again. Have mercy on us, bring us back to yourself as those who once were dead but now have life through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Absolution:

May the God of love bring us back to himself, forgive us our sins, and assure us of his eternal love in Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Collect for today

Let us pray for a closer union with Christ, in His suffering and in His glory.

Almighty God, who through your only-begotten Son Jesus Christ have overcome death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life: grant that, as by your grace going before us you put into our minds good desires, so by your continual help we may bring them to good effect; through Jesus Christ our risen Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen

Readings for today

The Old Testament reading today is from Psalm 31 verses 1 to 5:

For the director of music. A psalm of David.

¹ In you, LORD, I have taken refuge; let me never be put to shame deliver me in your righteousness.

² Turn your ear to me, come quickly to my rescue; be my rock of refuge, a strong fortress to save me.

³ Since you are my rock and my fortress, for the sake of your name lead and guide me.

⁴ Keep me free from the trap that is set for me, for you are my refuge.

⁵ Into your hands I commit my spirit; deliver me, LORD, my faithful God.

Jesus comforts his disciples

14 'Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me.

² My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you?

³ And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.

⁴ You know the way to the place where I am going.'

Jesus the way to the Father

⁵ Thomas said to him, 'Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?'

⁶ Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.

⁷ If you really know me, you will know^[b] my Father as well. From now on, you do know him and have seen him.'

⁸ Philip said, 'Lord, show us the Father and that will be enough for us.'

⁹ Jesus answered: 'Don't you know me, Philip, even after I have been among you such a long time? Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, "Show us the Father"?'

¹⁰ Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak on my own authority. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work.

¹¹ Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the works themselves.

¹² Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father.

¹³ And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son.

¹⁴ You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Talk

John 14 v 1-14

I am the Way and the Truth and the Life.

On a holiday some years ago to Portugal, my family and I made friends with an Irish girl. We got on really well and as a result we vowed to keep in touch. The next year she came to visit us – we were happy to let her have our spare bedroom. Next she wanted us to visit her – as it turned out we were going to Ireland with my brother and sister-in-law. So we asked –Are you sure there'll be enough room for us all to stay with you? Yes she assured us.

I imagined that she lived in an ordinary house in an ordinary street, perhaps 2 or 3 bedrooms at the most. How would she manage to squeeze in 7 of us? Were we all going to sleep on the living room floor?

Anyway all was arranged – we picked up our hire car from the airport and eventually found our way to her address. We turned into the drive and then we realised This wasn't an ordinary street, and it wasn't an ordinary house. It was a mansion – no need to worry – lots of rooms. We couldn't believe it! It was huge, like a hotel! This was her father's house.

That is the image that Jesus is using. He is going away, and naturally the disciples are anxious about where he's going and whether they will be able to follow him. So he speaks in v2 of his Father's house where there are many rooms – rooms for everyone and he is going to prepare a place for them.

The promise is made as a way of assuring the disciples that, though he's going away, it will be for their benefit; he won't forget them, he won't abandon them. But these words reach out beyond the disciples on that dark spring evening and embrace all of us. These words are often used at funerals and we can understand why. Jesus' words show that the way to eternal life, though unseen, is secure – as secure as our trust in Jesus. He has already prepared the way to eternal life. In Christ our long term future is secure.

There are few verses in Scripture that describe eternal life, but these few verses are rich with promises. Here Jesus says, "I am going to prepare a place for you," and "I will come back." We can look forward to eternal life because Jesus has promised it to all who believe in him. We will be with Jesus for ever.

In v5 Thomas asks what many of us would probably want to say "We don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?"

Jesus answers with the well-known words in v6 "I am the Way and the Truth and the Life." We can know the way to God through Jesus. Jesus is the way because he is both God and man. By uniting our lives with his, we are united with God. We can trust Jesus to take us to the Father, and all the benefits of being God's child will be ours.

Philip in v8 then wants to be shown the Father. Jesus' reply is to point out to Philip that if we look at Jesus we will know the Father. Look at Jesus – the Jesus who wept at the tomb of his friend, the Jesus who washed his follower's feet, the Jesus who healed the blind man – LOOK – and you will see the true God! Jesus is the visible, tangible image of the invisible God.

So what about us today? Don't we naturally ask similar questions to Philip? V12 points to us having the faith to believe that as his followers we can continue to do what Jesus did, so long as Jesus intercedes for us in heaven.

V14 "You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it." These words are a direct encouragement to the simple, yet great duty of praying and relying on the working of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the very presence of God within us and all believers, helping us live as God wants and building Christ's church here on earth.

So as Christians there is a place prepared for us in heaven. Something to look forward to...being with Christ for ever!

In the stained glass window above the altar at Holy Trinity Hartshill it says the words "Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life." Jesus is our Way – in him God and man meet. Jesus is our Truth - true to all who trust him. Jesus is our Life – we are alive to God.

Jesus the Way, the Truth and the Life, He is the beginning, the middle and the end. In him we must set out, go on and finish.

In this extraordinary time of our lives when nothing seems 'normal', when some are sad, some despairing, some tired and overworked, others isolated and lonely....it is at this time, we as Christians need to remember the hope of our faith. Our passage today began with the words, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God; trust also in me." Remembering these words is important in times such as these. We can trust God for our future, in Him is mercy, peace and hope. So let us rely on God's promises and trust Him each day to meet our needs

The Peace

The risen Christ came and stood among his disciples and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then were they glad when they saw the Lord.

Give grace to us, our families and friends, and to all our neighbours; that we may serve in Christ in one another and love as he loves us.

Lord in your mercy - **hear our prayer.**

Lord God, we pray for all those who are ill at this time with the Covid 19 virus or with other illness. We also pray for those who are suffering from worry, sadness, loneliness or other problems at this time.

We ask that you will support and give skill to all those who care for those who are in need and through them those who suffer can learn more of your love and care.

We pray for doctors, nurses and other staff working in our hospitals and for all care workers in residential homes and those visiting and caring for the elderly and vulnerable in their homes.

We pray in particular for those listed later on our notice sheet today and we now bring before you those we know who need your help at this time. Give all those we have prayed for, courage and hope in their troubles and bring them the joy of your salvation.

Lord in your mercy - **hear our prayer.**

Lord God, we pray for those whose lives have recently been saddened by the death of a relative or friend. Rejoicing in the fellowship of all your saints who shone as lights in the world, we pray that they will inspire us to develop pure hearts and work for you to show the joy of your salvation given to us by the life and death of your dear Son Jesus Christ.

Merciful Father - Accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

For us all

Coronavirus Guidance

Following Church of England advice, there are no services of public worship at Holy Trinity or St Peter's Church for the foreseeable future. This sadly includes all baptisms and weddings. The situation with funerals is also extremely difficult for those mourning the loss of a loved one.

Please hold in your prayers all those couples and families who are affected by this.

The Churches' Premises are closed to everyone- please do not attempt to access them with any keys that you may have.

Daily Hope

Daily Hope is a free phone line of hymns, reflections and prayers launched by the Church of England this week. It has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind. So, if you know someone in this situation, please phone them and tell them about free-phone **0800 804 8044**, and why not try it for yourselves.

Food Bank

Obviously due the measures taken to deal with the coronavirus we are not able to continue with the bringing of items to Church or deliveries to the warehouse.

This is at a time when the Food Bank is going to be under huge pressure especially now the schools are closed.

In the last month, the Food Bank has distributed food to 573 people including 227 children.

The Food Bank is still working with its volunteers and there are collection points in most supermarkets. If you are visiting a supermarket for your own shopping please consider adding a few items to donate in this way. A list of the most urgently required items can be found on the food bank website. Please note, they are no longer able to accept infant formula milk or baby food due to a UNICEF directive.

Can we urge everyone to consider if they can give a donation of money?

Please visit their website- www.nuneaton.foodbank.org.uk and click on the Donate button at the top right of the page.

This is a really valuable way we can collectively, as a Church, show our love to vulnerable people in our society.

Scams - Be careful

Please be aware there are an increased number of scams doing the rounds trying to take advantage of these difficult times. Before clicking on links, giving out bank details etc... do check they are genuine as there are some very plausible and convincing scammers.

Library Books and Services

As you all know libraries are currently closed to the public and you may run out of reading material during the lock down / isolation.

However WCC Library is still working remotely and anyone who is not already a member can join remotely. In particular it is possible to access and download e-books through their services.

All you need to access these for free are your library card number and email address. Visit <https://library.warwickshire.gov.uk/> to find out how.

If you're not already a Warwickshire Libraries member you can join online, visit <https://library.warwickshire.gov.uk/> and click 'Join Online'. Our library staff will send you your membership number and then you can get started straight away!

If you are running out of books and have not access to a computer or tablet then use this notice sheet to see if anyone in the Churches have the type of books that you normally read and maybe they can deliver them to your door – of course respecting social distancing requirements.

Parish Giving Scheme- Launch of New Telephone Service

Information for Hartshill only who has already has this service set up...

As you may know we have introduced a new way that people can give to the church on a regular basis (planned giving). It involves setting up a Direct Debit from your bank and making a regular, usually monthly, donation to the church. It is easier than cash giving and allows you to review your contributions annually with a view to keeping in line with inflation. This note is to make everyone aware that this facility can now be set-up over the phone with the Parish Giving Scheme staff. The phone number is **0333 002 1271**.

We fully appreciate that in the current circumstances, the timing of this may not be right for everyone but if you do want to set this facility up you will need the following information:

Your bank account details (Sort code, account number, name of bank and address)

The name of the parish (Holy Trinity Hartshill Nuneaton)

You will be asked if you would like to increase your gift in line with inflation each year (this is not compulsory and you have the ability to say 'No' each year).

You will be asked if you would like to gift aid your donation.

You will need the PGS code for the parish (For Hartshill this is **110611081**).

Leaflet details

The Parish Giving Scheme is delighted to announce the launch of a new telephone service, designed to enable prospective donors to set up a regular Direct Debit donation to your parish **over the phone**.

How will it work?

The service will go live on Monday 27th April 2020 and will operate weekdays between 9 - 5pm.

Please encourage prospective donors to set up a regular gift to your parish by calling our dedicated telephone line: **0333 002 1271**

One of our administrators will take them through the sign up process – this normally takes around 15 minutes. They will need to have the following information to hand:

- Personal bank account details
- The name of the parish they wish to donate to
- They will need to confirm if they want to increase their gift in line with inflation each year
- Confirm if they are eligible for Gift Aid
- The PGS code for their parish (usually 9 digits in length) *

****Note: This is the one piece of information that the donor will not have. Please ensure they have this information, to guarantee the gift goes to the correct parish.***

What happens next?

Donors will receive written confirmation (by email or post) of their Direct Debit, including details of the parish they are supporting, the amount of their gift and the date of their first donation.

Please note that if they currently give to the church via standing order, we advise them to wait until receiving the confirmation letter from PGS before attempting to cancel it.

How will our parish be notified of the donation?

The parish's Planned Giving representative will receive a monthly statement, detailing the names of those who have donated (unless they choose to remain anonymous) and all the gifts given through the PGS.

What if they need to change their donation?

If donors wish to make any changes to their Direct Debit, they should notify a member of the PGS team by phone 0333 002 1260, email info@parishgiving.org.uk or in writing to the address below.



Message from Sharon

Rainbow – a symbol of hope

In the past weeks of my prayers and worship I've been reflecting on the rainbow - a picture used to give a message of hope and support initially from children that is being used throughout Europe during this pandemic.

God said to Noah (Genesis 9:8-19) "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature... for all future generations. I have set my bow in the clouds, ... a covenant between me and the earth."

How wonderful that it was this symbol of hope that is chosen to be used right in this moment in time. Remember this sign is a promise to the whole earth for "every living creature."

I'm hoping that like me, you will all have been feeling that God isn't ignoring this global pandemic and that in fact he is very much working through it in the loving, giving, caring and sometimes even sacrificial relationships that are happening throughout all of our communities, whatever and wherever they may be.

In today's Bible reading Jesus's encouragement to "not let your hearts be troubled" is very much based on our acknowledgement and trust in the promises of God. If we trust that Jesus' given promises are absolute (as God's are) then when he says "I will take you to myself so that where I am, there we may be also," then we have nothing but hope, even in the midst of the fears and separation that this pandemic causes; hope that God is with us and in us in this life and hope that we shall indeed dwell with him beyond our human life.

I pray this is the hope that we will cling to – that we will believe that the promises of God are trustworthy, no matter what we each have to face and experience – alone or together. Even when our experience is one that only we alone must face, God will be with us if we only ask. And in community, God's children too may well walk with us when we invite them to. Then, just like the relationship of Father, Son and Holy Spirit and God's relationship with his children, our experience is always in relationship and never alone.



Message from Ray (GC)

As Christians, we all want to see God in the face, but actually we probably have already seen him. You may ask, how is this possible?

Well, taking the Covid-19 crisis into consideration, think about all the kind acts and the kind faces of the people who have supported you in whatever manner, through these very tough times.

Next time someone drops some food off, delivers something or telephones you, either look at their face through the window, or imagine their face. Their kind acts are inspired through their human kindness and are God driven. Remember God said I make you in my own image. Therefore, when you look at the face, or imagine the face of the one who has helped you, are we not looking at the face of God through their acts?

This was reflected by author and scholar Beatrice Bruteau who said "*Jesus had a fundamental vision—faith that all people are "children of God." This is the theological perspective of his "program," on which everything else rests. I am supposing that he took this seriously, more or less literally, . . . teaching that each person has an uncreated soul that is actually a continuation of the Divine Life itself. When Jesus met a person, therefore, he really believed that God was somehow present in that person, so he looked for that presence through all the overlying contradictions to it, until he found it. Then he addressed himself to that point in the person.*"

I've watched a film on TV during the day, I've baked, knitted crocheted, finished several projects that have been ongoing (embarrassingly) for years, walked endlessly in the woods, admiring the wonderful display of bluebells, quizzed by Zoom, Facetimed, read, listened to audio books....the list goes on. What I have learned over the last few weeks though, is it's OK to just do nothing, or to just do what I fancy rather than what I feel I should do. This has been a difficult time, not seeing children and grandchildren, not sharing fellowship in person, but it has been a valuable lesson for me in particular as I have learned that I don't have to fill my time, and that I don't need to feel guilty if I just sit, read, take in the view - I'm sure I'm not the only one!!! So as the old saying goes, "every cloud has a silver lining"...let's hope I can keep it up after things are relaxed a bit!!

Message from Nick B-B

I can really relate to Carol's message about learning to take time out. I love to keep busy but I too have tried to find more quiet periods (often in the garden!) and reflect on God's blessings to myself, Jan and our family. In my reflections I have been wondering how this isolation will affect my feelings and actions when this is all over and we are encouraged to live more normally.

Jan will tell you that I do not like going away. I do not like the travelling and when I am away I am looking forward to coming home even though I will be enjoying myself. I think for everyone their home represents a safe and secure haven where you can feel more relaxed and not worry so much about what is going on outside. That has never been truer for me than in this lockdown- I have been happy at home feeling protected from the outside world but that is not how it should be. God wants us to be out there doing His work and many people are doing just that.

I have never felt nervous about going for a walk, or doing the shopping, or going to Church. How will I feel about resuming those activities? It will be easy to feel worried and negative and that could change the way I relate to people. When the time comes I will need to remember the opening verse of our Gospel reading today: "Do not let your hearts be troubled, you believe in God, believe also in me."

Message from Debbie (GC)

Before I started attending St Peter's I had always worshipped by myself and now I'm doing so again. But it's not the same. For I know that as I read the service at home I'm not alone there is a community, a family out there who care about me and that I care about, who are also worshipping in the same way I am, saying the same words reading the same service together even though we are apart, I don't feel alone in the way I used to those years ago before God guided me to St Peter's.

This time has helped me to reflect on just how much better worship is when it's done as part of a community.
