

Introduction

On Trinity Sunday, Christians remember and honour the eternal God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

The Trinity is the belief that God is one in essence (Greek *ousia*), but distinct in person (Greek *hypostasis*). This can be difficult to understand and is often referred to as a mystery. The Greek word for person means "that which stands on its own," or "individual reality," and does not mean the persons of the Trinity are three human beings. Christians believe that the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are somehow distinct from one another (not divided though), yet completely united in will and essence. How can this be? Well, think of the sight of two eyes. The eyes are distinct, yet one and undivided in their sight. Another illustration to explain the Trinity is the musical chord. Think of a C-chord. The C, E, and G notes are all distinct notes, but joined together as one chord the sound is richer and more dynamic than had the notes been played individually. The chords are all equally important in producing the rich sound, and the sound is lacking and thin if one of the notes is left out so it is with the Trinity of God, the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit.

Opening Prayers

Let us pray that the Spirit will work through our lives to bring Christ to the world.

Almighty and everlasting God, you have given us your servant's grace, by the confession of a true faith, to acknowledge the glory of the eternal Trinity and in the power of the divine majesty to worship the Unity: keep us steadfast in this faith, that we may evermore be defended from all adversities; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Thanks be to God

Talk

Lord, by your spirit would you open your word to our hearts and our hearts to your word. Amen.

So, this week is Trinity Sunday – which is either a preacher's dream or nightmare. I think I may have confessed to this before that the first time I preached on Trinity Sunday (whilst on placement) apparently I managed to commit heresy – without realising it!!!

I spoke about the Trinity in such a way that it was classed to have been in the form of an historically heretical model of the trinity.....which I had managed to do without even trying!!! Oops....as the irony and reality of it being I probably wouldn't have been quite as heretical normally even if I had tried!!!

Another lesson I hold on to however, also from college, is when a much loved and well respected tutor gave us a 'free pass' with the whole topic of the Trinity. Even he (with the brain the size of a planet) said the Trinity "wasn't a problem to be solved but a mystery to enjoy" which enabled us all to give a huge sigh of relief as we battled on with writing essays on highbrow / intellectual Theology whilst 'just' trying to enjoy God in the process.

Trinity Sunday is also the 'patronal festival' of Holy Trinity Hartshill, and so by tradition is also its 'Gift Day'. (Patronal just means Patron of...the festival of the namesake of the church.) St Peter's Patronal festival and Gift Day fall on the closest Sunday to the feast day of St Peter – which this year is June 28th.....so please forgive me that I am doing the same 'gift day' sermon for both parishes at the same time as the teaching on giving is relevant for us all as both as an individual, as a church and as both churches corporately together (also known as a benefice). And I think it is important for us, as we do think of one another in our 'own' church and across the benefice – about the gift of one another, working together, respecting and most of all loving one another. And it's a real gift to me to be doing all our services together at the moment – not least of all being able to be in two places and churches at once! Working and worshipping and witnessing together as one. And that is what the Trinity should represent for all of us too - regardless of the name of our church! God, by definition of the Trinity, loves, honours and serves each other as Father, Son and Holy Spirit - with a sense of mutuality and deference – giving of themselves to one another and to us...for example just like we celebrated last week in the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

Nick BB spoke last week in the message section about the joy of giving quoting 2 Corinthians Chapter 9 verses 6 and 7 which says, 'The point is this, whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly and whoever sows brilliantly will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver'. Now I have been told that one translation of the word 'cheerful' from the original biblical text is the same root as the word 'hilarious' - meaning God loves an hilarious giver – which suddenly and certainly brings out the joy that can come from helping, serving and giving to others.

You may be familiar with the ARK movement – no not about Noah!!! but ARK – Acts of Random Kindness – where people do random lovely things for others. These acts of kindness are not for recognition or reward or reciprocity but often done secretly, selflessly and for the sheer desire to be kind to others. Now during lockdown we have seen this happening all over the place, people 'just' being kind – and as someone on the receiving end of some of this I can tell you first-hand what an absolute blessing and encouragement it has been to me.

Another biblical principle is that it is 'better to give than to receive' and again this is a lesson I have learned from someone only a couple of weeks ago. At college I was blessed to work with an amazing member of staff who taught me so much through the time and prayer they gave to me. Through a very happy coincidence (definitely God-incidence!) I made contact with them again in more recent years and again they offered me time and prayer from their own time now in a non-staff role. I must

admit I have often felt guilty for time they 'gave' to me as they no longer had an official role in my training or ministry. However when I tried to say this they would simply say it was a pleasure to help, ...and so I had to learn to have the grace to receive this gift of support.

A few weeks ago I received a text from them asking if I could speak to them to help them with a situation they were in. I was a bit dumbfounded as I felt I had nothing to 'give' to them – as I always perceived them to be my senior and so the lessons to learn would only ever be one way. However, the circumstances that they needed help with was something I was able to offer support for as I was more experienced in this area due to my context and recent events I had been involved with. I was capable (and very pleased) to have been able to talk them through some practicalities than enabled them to navigate the problem that was ahead of them. As the day in question came to pass I was able to send a text to assure them of my thoughts and prayers (something they have done for me in the past) and when they thanked me...I heard myself saying... "my pleasure".... Why?...because it really was! I was thrilled to be able to help out, humbled that I had been asked and so grateful to God that I was able to give something of myself, the gifts and skills God has given to me, my time and my support to someone else.... Definitely more blessed to give than receive ...and I am so grateful to God for teaching me of this at this time.

Our reading today reminds us we simply cannot out give God – for His resources are infinite and all we have are crumbs in comparison.

In one sense we have nothing to give. It's like being invited to a royal wedding as a guest – where a set of plates or a bale of towels would feel so inadequate to give as a gift to someone wearing a royal tiara or crown! But just like the widow's mite was seen as the greatest treasure by Jesus...giving ourselves and our affection to God is 'all' he requires. Because in one sense we do have nothing else to give... which is why 'all' God wants is us and our hearts.... And no matter how bad we may feel about ourselves as an offering....God receives it with joy and delight as a good parent receives an 'abstract' barely formed drawing from a little child and puts it in pride of place on the fridge! And so is the same with us....even if we don't know what the picture of our life should look like or we feel our effort is feeble and frail...if it is given with love....it will be received with even greater love.

So I reckon the invitation and opportunity to give – isn't for God's benefit...but for ours. To give to God keeps ourselves humble before Him and dependent on Him. We don't love and give and serve God because God needs it...but because we, our neighbours and the world needs it.

Again our reading reminds us of the greatness of God...

²⁸ Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. ²⁹ He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak.

God knows our frailty and fragility and yet loves us as we are anyway. He invites us and welcomes us to respond to that love...not for His sake...but for ours. God 'only' wants us, as us. God as Holy Trinity wants us to give ourselves to him as He is God the father who created us, God the son through Jesus died for us and God the Holy Spirit who lives and dwells within us.

For us to be able to live lives of giving, serving and loving both God and others - God will ultimately bless us and bless others through that blessing. As I said only a few weeks before lockdown in one of the sermons... we are all blessed to be a blessing...and I thank God for helping me to understand both sides of that coin.

I want to end with something written last year specifically about the financial aspect of giving for gift day whilst acknowledging and giving thanks to God for the other ways you may 'give'...whether it be time, activities or other ways of serving God, the church and the community.

....please do prayerfully consider your 'gifts' to the church and to God.....

You may want to review how much you already give and consider increasing it if you haven't already done so for several years. Please remember what you give is between you and God which is why we say prayerfully consider it - whilst recognising that we can never out-give God. Some Christians follow the principle of tithing (giving 10% of our income) which to some may seem quite high. However, if we also take seriously our offertory prayer (from the bible) that all things come from God and of His own we give to Him - then someone once suggested rather than seeing it as giving 10% it's actually God's grace of letting us keep 90%!

And please only do give in the knowledge of the promises of God as....

On this 'gift day', St Peter's (gift) Day in a few weeks and Trinity Sunday - may you know God's abundant gifts, blessings and goodness to you as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

We remember all those who work in our hospitals as well as those in clinics, care settings, community food banks, places of shelter for the vulnerable, retail workers, emergency service personnel, teachers and all other key workers and front line staff.

We ask for your presence with our young people. Help and protect those in higher education, as well as those in nurseries and schools. If they are anxious or fearful, help them to cope.

We pray for the elderly and those who are still shielding. Grant them your presence in loneliness and peace in anxious moments.

Hear us as we remember those who have died in the faith of Christ; according to your promises, grant us, with them, a share in your eternal kingdom.

Almighty God, Father of all mercies and giver of all comfort, deal graciously, we pray you, with those who mourn that, casting every care on you, they may know the consolation of your love.

He set himself a target to do 100 circuits of his large garden before his 100th birthday using a walking frame. He set out to raise £1000 to support NHS staff and as we know raised almost £33 million. I was watching Countryfile last Sunday and some of you will have seen an interview between John Craven and Tom. He said they were doing it day and night and yet are doing it so cheerfully.

For us all

Coronavirus Guidance

Following Church of England advice, there are no services of public worship at Holy Trinity or St Peter's Church for the foreseeable future. This sadly includes all baptisms and weddings. The situation with funerals is also extremely difficult for those mourning the loss of a loved one.

Please hold in your prayers all those couples and families who are affected by this. The Churches' Premises are closed to everyone- please do not attempt to access them with any keys that you may have.

Daily Hope

Daily Hope is a free phone line of hymns, reflections and prayers launched by the Church of England. It has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind. So, if you know someone in this situation, please phone them and tell them about free-phone **0800 804 8044**, and why not try it for yourselves.

Food Bank

Obviously due the measures taken to deal with the coronavirus we are not able to continue with the bringing of items to Church or deliveries to the warehouse.

This is at a time when the Food Bank is under huge pressure, especially with schools closed.

In the three weeks from April 19th, the food bank has distributed food to 332 people including 104 children (9.26 tons)

The food bank is still working with its volunteers and there are collection points in most supermarkets. If you are visiting a supermarket for your own shopping please consider adding a few items to donate in this way. A list of the most urgently required items can be found on the food bank website.

Please note, they are no longer able to accept infant formula milk or baby food due to a UNICEF directive.

Can we urge everyone to consider if they can give a donation of money?

This is a really valuable way we can collectively as a Church show our love to the vulnerable people in our society.

Scams - Be careful

Parish Giving Scheme- Launch of New Telephone Service

This is information for Holy Trinity only, for those who have already got this service set up...

As you may know we have introduced a new way that people can give to the church on a regular basis (planned giving). It involves setting up a Direct Debit from your bank and making a regular, usually monthly, donation to the church. It is easier than cash giving and allows you to review your contributions annually with a view to keeping in line with inflation. This note is to make everyone aware that this facility can now be set-up over the phone with the Parish Giving Scheme staff. The phone number is **0333 002 1271**.

We fully appreciate that in the current circumstances, the timing of this may not be right for everyone but if you do want to set this facility up you will need the following information:

Your bank account details (Sort code, account number, name of bank and address)

The name of the parish (Holy Trinity Hartshill Nuneaton)

You will be asked if you would like to increase your gift in line with inflation each year (this is not compulsory and you have the ability to say 'No' each year).

You will be asked if you would like to gift aid your donation.

You will need the PGS code for the parish (For Hartshill this is **110611081**).

The leaflet below has more details if you need them.

Leaflet details

The Parish Giving Scheme is delighted to announce the launch of a new telephone service, designed to enable prospective donors to set up a regular Direct Debit donation to your parish **over the phone**.

How will it work?

The service will go live on Monday 27th April 2020 and will operate weekdays between 9 - 5pm.

Please encourage prospective donors to set up a regular gift to your parish by calling our dedicated telephone line: **0333 002 1271**

One of our administrators will take them through the sign up process – this normally takes around 15 minutes. They will need to have the following information to hand:

- Personal bank account details

- The name of the parish they wish to donate to
- They will need to confirm if they want to increase their gift in line with inflation each year
- Confirm if they are eligible for Gift Aid
- The PGS code for their parish (usually 9 digits in length) *

***Note: This is the one piece of information that the donor will not have. Please ensure they have this information, to guarantee the gift goes to the correct parish.**

What happens next?

Donors will receive written confirmation (by email or post) of their Direct Debit, including details of the parish they are supporting, the amount of their gift and the date of their first donation.

Please note that if they currently give to the church via standing order, we advise them to wait until receiving the confirmation letter from PGS before attempting to cancel it.

How will our parish be notified of the donation?

The parish's Planned Giving representative will receive a monthly statement, detailing the names of those who have donated (unless they choose to remain anonymous) and all the gifts given through the PGS.

What if they need to change their donation?

If donors wish to make any changes to their Direct Debit, they should notify a member of the PGS team by phone 0333 002 1260, email info@parishgiving.org.uk or in writing to the address below.
