Introduction

The Great Fifty Days of Eastertide form a single festival period in which the tone of joy created on Easter Day is sustained through the following seven weeks, and the Church celebrates the gloriously risen Christ:
Triumphant in his glory now, his sceptre ruleth all, earth, heaven and hell before him bow, and at his footstool fall. (Fulbert of Chartres)

Opening Response

Here are words you may trust:

Remember Jesus Christ, risen from the dead: he is our salvation, our eternal glory.

If we die with him, we shall live with him; if we endure, we shall reign with him.

If we deny him, he will deny us; if we are faithless, he keeps faith.

For he has broken the power of death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. cf 2 Timothy 2.11–13

Confession

Christ died to sin once for all, and now he lives to God. Let us renew our resolve to have done with all that is evil and confess our sins in penitence and faith. cf Romans 6.10

Let us start by reflecting on the week that has just passed.

Thank God for all the blessings you have received.

Consider the things which we have done, or not done, or even our thoughts, which we now wish to say sorry to God for:

Father, we have sinned against heaven and against you. We are not worthy to be called your children. We turn to you again. Have mercy on us, bring us back to yourself as those who once were dead but now have life through Christ our Lord.

May the God of love and power forgive us and free us from our sins, heal and strengthen us by His Spirit, and raise us to new life in Christ our Lord. Amen.

Collect for today

Reading for today

Acts Chapter 2 verses 42 to 47 (perhaps read it twice)

The fellowship of the believers.

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³ Everyone was filled with awe, and many wonders and miraculous signs were done by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵ Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as he had need. ⁴⁶ Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

Talk

Thursday, 8.00 p.m., there's a loud bang as a firework explodes in the sky. Set off by someone up the road, we respond by going out of our front doors, along with others all over the country, applauding in appreciation of NHS, Carers, and all those others we now recognise as doing great and essential jobs for the good of our community.

Thursday evenings we see neighbours, up and down the road, coming together (at the correct distance of course), greeting each other, waving to those we hardly ever see, as if they are long lost friends. We wonder about those who don't come out, are they alright?

The Thursday evening Clap for Carers is something that is beginning to bind us together as a community once again. Over recent times, people seem to have desired isolation, going home, closing the door, sitting down in front of the T.V. and keeping the world safely outside. So it surprises me that as soon as we're told to isolate ourselves, we suddenly discover a need to come together as community. It seems to be that taking community away has made us recognise how much we are part of it and how much we need it.

Luke has just ended his report of the events of Pentecost with 3,000 people coming to faith. He doesn't continue with further stories of great sermons, and missionary outreach programs, but concentrates instead on how the new community of believers has come together and is growing.

They are devoted to four things above all others: the teaching of the apostles, the fellowship, breaking of [The] bread (the word bread, in the Greek, is prefixed by a definite article 'the', which adds emphasis, THE Bread, i.e. Jesus' body, Communion), and prayer.

Luke doesn't give details of the apostles' teaching, but I think it is fair to assume they followed Jesus' command to teach converts to obey everything He commanded (Matthew 28:20), "Love God, love your neighbour as yourself, and to love each other as He loved us."

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35)

The letters reveal that much teaching was needed, explaining how we are saved through Jesus' death and resurrection and how to live as a fellowship of believers. Devoted to the fellowship, Luke tells us how they met daily in the Temple, supported each other in times of need, selling possessions if required, sharing meals and times together in each other's homes. They celebrated Communion together, and devoted themselves to prayer, both central parts of our spiritual needs.

People saw how this new community were living, and were attracted to it, to find out more and become believers themselves, and join them. The people were in awe of signs and wonders that were performed by the apostles, and how the people hold everything in common, helping those in need. This was a community of hope in a time of Roman occupation and control. These believers offered a hope that could win through suffering, because Jesus had suffered, died, was buried but rose again, alive for evermore.

The 'Clap for Carers' is, I believe, a recognition of a deep-rooted need to be part of something greater than ourselves. A search for hope in a suffering world. We as Church offer this hope that people are searching for.

Therefore, we have an opportunity to ask ourselves, do those who are searching see it when they look at our fellowship? Are we as devoted to learning, to the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and to prayer as that original community of believers? What in our behaviour could God use to attract those who are lost and searching to belong?

Belinda and I have used the 'lock down' time to catch up on some T.V. programs we missed. One was 'Britain's Easter Story' with choirmaster Gareth Malone and gospel choir conductor Karen Gibson, travelling around the country looking at the music and traditions we use to celebrate Easter. Karen's mother told of her search to find a church when she first came to this country from the Caribbean. She visited her local church, who said they were pleased to see her, but could she not visit too often because it would upset the regular fellowship.

Every church fellowship I've been to believes it is welcoming, and yet those outside the church feel this is not the case, many believe the church has nothing to offer them. Perhaps we should make more of the fact that church is here for everyone, including sinners. The fellowship Luke describes is one that offered hope and love during times of suffering and hardship and was ready to welcome newcomers. Isn't this what our community badly needs at this time? St. Francis of Assisi's advice to 'Preach the Gospel always, use words only when necessary', is good, practical advice for us today. It is of little use just talking the Gospel of Jesus, people need to see how we live it! Our devotion to God, to each other, to sharing Communion and to prayer, will demonstrate the love we have for God and for one another.

Love that is for all the world.

Love that Jesus encouraged us to share.

Love that does not judge or condemn.

Love that is for everyone.

Love that the world needs to witness us living.

Love that God will use.

Love that brings hope.

Please pray that God, through his Holy Spirit will mould us into a fellowship devoted to Him, and for the wider community to find Him and receive the hope and belonging He offers through witnessing the life of our fellowship.

We pray for ourselves as a Church. Now, more than ever, we recognise our dependence on one another. Teach us how to sustain our faith and hope at this time as we worship in new ways. Help us to care and show love for one another. - - - - -

Help us Lord to love one another

We ask Lord, that you will be in with the people who find themselves in difficult situations, as we continue to be in lockdown and there is the need to respect social distancing. Help the angry, anxious, lonely, and abused. Be close to those who are sick, in physical pain and those who suffer from mental anguish. Take care of our young people. - - - - - let us name in our hearts those whom we know are in difficulty at this time.

For us all

Coronavirus Guidance

Following Church of England advice, there are no services of public worship at Holy Trinity or St Peter's Church for the foreseeable future. This sadly includes all baptisms and weddings. The situation with funerals is also extremely difficult for those mourning the loss of a loved one.

Please hold in your prayers all those couples and families who are affected by this.

The Churches' Premises are closed to everyone- please do not attempt to access them with any keys that you may have.

Daily Hope

Daily Hope is a free phone line of hymns, reflections and prayers launched by the Church of England this week. It has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind. So, if you know someone in this situation, please phone them and tell them about free-phone **0800 804 8044**, and why not try it for yourselves.

Food Bank

Obviously due the measures taken to deal with the coronavirus we are not able to continue with the bringing of items to Church or deliveries to the warehouse.

This is at a time when the Food Bank is going to be under huge pressure especially now the schools are closed.

In the last month, the Food Bank has distributed food to 573 people including 227 children.

The Food Bank is still working with its volunteers and there are collection points in most supermarkets. If you are visiting a supermarket for your own shopping please consider adding a few items to donate in this way. A list of the most urgently required items can be found on the food bank website. Please note, they are no longer able to accept infant formula milk or baby food due to a UNICEF directive.

Can we urge everyone to consider if they can give a donation of money?

Please visit their website- www.nuneaton.foodbank.org.uk and click on the Donate button at the top right of the page.

This is a really valuable way we can collectively, as a Church, show our love to vulnerable people in our society.

Scams - Be careful

Please be aware there are an increased number of scams doing the rounds trying to take advantage of these difficult times. Before clicking on links, giving out bank details etc... do check they are genuine as there are some very plausible and convincing scammers.

Library Books and Services

As you all know libraries are currently closed to the public and you may run out of reading material during the lock down / isolation.

However WCC Library is still working remotely and anyone who is not already a member can join remotely. In particular it is possible to access and download e-books through their services.

All you need to access these for free are your library card number and email address. Visit <https://library.warwickshire.gov.uk/> to find out how.

If you're not already a Warwickshire Libraries member you can join online, visit <https://library.warwickshire.gov.uk/> and click 'Join Online'. Our library staff will send you your membership number and then you can get started straight away!

If you are running out of books and have not access to a computer or tablet then use this notice sheet to see if anyone in the Churches have the type of books that you normally read and maybe they can deliver them to your door – of course respecting social distancing requirements.

Parish Giving Scheme- Launch of New Telephone Service

The Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) is delighted to announce the launch of a new telephone service, designed to enable prospective donors to set up a regular Direct Debit donation to your parish **over the phone**.

How will it work?

The service will go live on Monday 27th April 2020 and will operate weekdays between 9 - 5pm.

Please encourage prospective donors to set up a regular gift to your parish by calling our dedicated telephone line: **0333 002 1271**

One of our administrators will take them through the sign up process – this normally takes around 15 minutes. They will need to have the following information to hand:

- Personal bank account details
- The name of the parish they wish to donate to
- They will need to confirm if they want to increase their gift in line with inflation each year
- Confirm if they are eligible for Gift Aid

- The PGS code for their parish (usually 9 digits in length) *

****Note: This is the one piece of information that the donor will not have. Please ensure they have this information, to guarantee the gift goes to the correct parish.***

What happens next?

Donors will receive written confirmation (by email or post) of their Direct Debit, including details of the parish they are supporting, the amount of their gift and the date of their first donation.

Please note that if they currently give to the church via standing order, we advise them to wait until receiving the confirmation letter from PGS before attempting to cancel it.

How will our parish be notified of the donation?

The parish's Planned Giving representative will receive a monthly statement, detailing the names of those who have donated (unless they choose to remain anonymous) and all the gifts given through the PGS.

What if they need to change their donation?

If donors wish to make any changes to their Direct Debit, they should notify a member of the PGS team by phone 0333 002 1260, email info@parishgiving.org.uk or in writing to the address below.

Message from Heather

One of my favourite Christian writers is Adrian Plass. I like his books because they are honest, real and often poignantly funny. He and his wife Bridget are doing daily reflections at the moment under the theme "no shore in sight" accompanied by a picture of them both in a boat! I love the title as it reflects the feeling of the unknown reality that we are living in at the moment...in a boat...but a little adrift....not sure exactly where or when we will land. This got me thinking about Jesus and boats...which gave me great hope... that even when there is no shore in sight....as long as Jesus is in sight....we will be ok. Why? Well as long as we stick with Jesus.... the storms will be stilled, the nets will be filled and still if in doubt – remember that Jesus could walk on water! The same was true for his disciple Peter as Jesus invited him to get out of the boat and walk towards him...which was ok until he got scared. At that point

Peter turned his eyes away from Jesus and instead gave his focus and attention to the wind and waves....and sadly he began to sink! An important lesson for us all to learn...what are we focusing our time and energy on at the moment? I'm not saying ignore the storm...it is a living reality...but let's keep our eyes fixed on Jesus first – the author and perfecter of our faith.

I find it hard to believe that this is our 7th virtual service. It still feels new but it has become firmly established in mine and Jan's Sunday morning routine.

At 10am you will find us sitting in our lounge with our 'I' pad and telephone tablet ready for action. We go through the service - I pretend I am still helping/assisting in services at Holy Trinity and we join in all the responses- at first we were very self-conscious but not so much now.

I will let you into a secret- sometimes in Church I do not focus as I should and my mind will wander into other passions (Last week's message!). That is definitely not happening at present and I think my worship is richer for that.

We are also reaching many more people in our virtual service on a regular basis (including in Northern Ireland).

I am sure most of us are looking forward to Church Services starting again whenever that may be but I think we will need to think about some of the positives of our current services in reaching out to people who cannot attend church for any reason.
