May Days

May is definitely one of my favourite months. After a long winter and the windy and showery weather in March and April, the month of May promises more settled, warmer and sunnier times. My garden also bursts into life with flowers on my alpine and shrubs. It is a time for optimism and to celebrate the proper arrival of Spring.

During May, the Church also celebrates with three linked festivals.

On Thursday 5th May we celebrate Ascension Day which is when Jesus took his disciples to the Mount of Olives where they watched as he ascended to Heaven. For the disciples it must have had an echo of the feelings they had after Jesus' death on Good Friday in terms of sadness, fear and uncertainty for their future. But this time Jesus had demonstrated at Easter that He is the Risen Lord and His presence would always be with them.

The disciples' mood was to change 10 days later at Pentecost when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit which inspired the disciples to start the early church and begin their mission for God. This year Pentecost, also known as Whitsun, takes place on Sunday 15th May. On this day we give thanks for the gift of Holy Spirit which is still at work in our lives today.

Then a week later (May 22nd) we celebrate Trinity Sunday, which uniquely for a Christian festival does not celebrate a person or an event but a concept. Trinity means a group of three and in our Christian belief the Holy Trinity represents the 3 elements of Father, Son and Holy Spirit that together make up our understanding of God. Trinity Sunday also has great significance for our Church as it is named after this concept.

So as we progress through May and celebrate these 3 festivals we can have confidence that:-

Our Father loves and cares for each one of us. Jesus (Son) is the risen Lord who has a constant place in our lives. The Holy Spirit is at work in us to help us carry out our mission for God. *God Bless - Nick B-B*

Praying for our Parish in May


- 1 A new month where God shows, with colour and growth, his beautiful creations. Let us care for and give thanks for them.

2nd Hartshill (Holy Trinity) Brownies Senior Section 100th Birthday Challenge 2016



The Brownies are currently taking part in a series of Challenges to celebrate the 100th birthday of the Senior Section of Guiding. This section is for girls aged between 14 and 26.

On the 5th April, as part of the Challenge, the Brownies divided into their Six Groups and interviewed five people who had been involved in Guiding for varying number of years. The visitors were interviewed individually using a set of pre notified questions varying from how long they have been in Guiding to what was their most memorable experience. We have four six groups in 2nd Hartshill Brownies - the Gnomes, the Pixies, the Elves and the Imps.



The Gnomes interviewed Chris Hunter, the former Guide Guider of 2nd Hartshill Guides and Lorraine Mayhew, a District Guider and former Brownie at our pack. Chris has been a Guiding member for 42 Years to date. She was a Brownie and then a Guide, a Ranger and later became a Guide Leader. Chris was in the Kelpies and was part of Camp Hill Brownie pack moving onto 4th Nuneaton Guides and 1st Nuneaton Rangers. Chris' best camp was when she went to London.

One of her most memorable experiences was when she stood by Niagara Falls when she represented Guides at an International camp in America as a Guide when she was aged 14. She enjoyed numerous camps both locally and at Blackwell, Arden and Bramcote Barracks as a Ranger. She has earned many badges over the years, her favourite badges she earned are Emergency Helper, 75 Jubilee and the Diamond Jubilee. She has been awarded her 10, 20, 25 years' badges as a Guider and is now a District Guider and mentor to new Guide Guiders. Her favourite Guiding song is "This little Guiding light of mine". The things that have changed since her day is the uniform and the wider range of badges. Guiding has taught her that you can do anything.

The Gnomes also interviewed Lorraine Mayhew formerly Wood. Lorraine has been in Guiding for 31 years. She was a member of both 2nd Hartshill Brownies and Guides. She was in Pixies at Brownies and achieved practically all the badges in the Brownie Badge Book. Her favourite badge was for swimming. One of the questions was about favourite books as a child and Lorraine said that she had enjoyed reading books by Enid Blyton. As a Leader she helped





run 1st Stockingford Guide unit and is currently a District Guider. A highlight of camping was going on an International camp and performing in front of the whole camp. The friends she made in Guiding and camping at Mancetter have given her lots of memorable moments. She also enjoyed indoor camping, outdoor cooking, ladders and Froggy. As a Leader she especially enjoyed taking the 1st Stockingford Guides to London. She felt that Guiding had taught her to be friends with everyone and she is in contact with lots of former Guiding friends, in particular Brown Owl and Chris Hunter, her former Guide Guider. She felt that the principles of Guiding were the same but the uniform had changed.

The Elves interviewed Jane Bennett, one of the two Warwickshire County Commissioners, who has been in Guiding for 36 years. She has helped at Brownies, Guides and Senior Section. As a child she enjoyed reading books such as Secret 7, Famous 5 and Mallory Towers. Jane is currently

running a Guide Unit, is also a County Commissioner and Trainer. She has been on numerous camps and loves sleeping in a tent. Her most embarrassing moment was when she was being tested for her camp licence and whilst straining the peas they ended up on the grass. However, Jane passed her licence and has gone on to take many girls away on camp at various places including Switzerland and Paris. Her favourite badge was her Queens Guide Award. Later she went on to have lunch with the Queen when she was invited to join the Golden Wedding Celebration Lunch at the Guildhall in London where there were lots of other representatives from Charities and lots of famous people. Another one of her most memorable moments was when she visited Drayton Manor for the 100th year Celebration of Guides when the majority of Midlands Guides and Leaders also attended. Her favourite annual outing is to the Big Gig. She enjoyed many aspects of Guiding but particularly liked the mornings and evenings of sleepovers, camping and outdoor challenges and the game Traffic Lights. She felt that Guiding has taught her how to Love. She felt that Guiding is more relaxed now and is not as strict as it used to be. She still has lots of contacts with friends she has made through Guiding.



The Imps interviewed Michelle Chaplin, Nuneaton Division Commissioner, and she has been Guiding for 44 years. She was in Sprites in Brownies and went on to be an Assistant Brownie Guider. She then moved onto being a Guide Guider and is also County Trainer. She has her licence to take both Brownies and Guides away and has an additional

licence to take the Brownies camping. She has many happy memories of her time in Guiding and particularly enjoys sleeping in a tent. She brought her camp blanket with her and there were some very interesting badges sewn on it including the Wonderland challenge and badges from the Big Gig which she particularly enjoyed going to, especially when she saw Olly Murs, Ed Sheeran and Little Mix. She was awarded her Queens Guide Award when she was 16 and the most embarrassing time for her was when she was awarded her 30-year Service Knot in front of 600 people. Michelle said that she really enjoyed celebrating 100 years of Guides at a special event at Drayton Manor. She felt that Guiding had taught her about Team work and caring for people. She had particularly enjoyed playing indoor hockey. She said that the Brownie uniform had changed three times and the Guide uniform twice together with the Promise and Law whilst she has been involved. She has represented Guiding four times internationally and really enjoyed visiting Switzerland and Paris. When asked about whether she was still in contact with friends whom she had met in the younger sections she said that her only regret was losing contact with a friend called Melanie whom she had tried to trace through Facebook without success.

The Pixies interviewed Speckle Owl, aka Amy Horton, the Senior Section Leader for Arbury District. Amy is also a County Trainer and has been in the Guiding movement since aged 7, when she joined the Brownies. She had been a Sprite which was a green creature with spiky hair. Speckled Owl achieved her Baden Powell Award in Guides and her favourite badge, the Duke of Edinburgh Award, was also achieved through Guiding. Her best memory of Guiding is seeing her Senior Section girls grow up. The Brownies particularly enjoyed looking at her camp blanket and the numerous badges Speckled Owl had achieved over the years. Overall the Pixies thought that she was a great Leader and very inspiring. They particularly enjoyed meeting her one-year-old son, Charlie.



On the 12th April the Brownie groups summarised the answers to the questions and this report is compiled from those findings. They look forward to many more challenges on the Senior Section 100th Celebration which they hope to complete by the end of May and will then be awarded their own celebration challenge badge which they can sew onto their own Camp Blanket and continue to make their own memories!



Christian Charity News

Christian Aid

From one of the smallest charities last month, to one of the largest this month, Christian Aid was founded in 1941 to help the world's poorest people. This month sees Christian Aid week from 15th - 21st May and you may be very familiar with the red and white envelopes which used to come through our letterboxes each year (maybe your street still have the door to door collection), or you may have seen the advertisements on your television screens.

Christian Aid's slogan is "We believe in life before death" and their mission is:- "Christian Aid insists the world can and must be swiftly changed to one where everyone can live a full life free from poverty. They work globally for profound change that eradicates the causes of poverty, striving to achieve equality, dignity and freedom for all regardless of faith or nationality."

When natural disasters strike, Christian Aid is one of the first charities to arrive, bringing emergency shelter, food and water, blankets and hygiene kits to those who have lost everything in earthquakes and floods.

They work in around 50 countries, alongside partner charities, in vastly differing situations. Unfortunately, there is always a need somewhere in the world, some natural, others man made (as in war zones). We have recently heard on the TV about a drought occurring in Ethiopia and where one country has no rain to water the crops, another such as Malawi and India have too much rain, destroying their crops with flooding. When one health epidemic such as Ebola in other parts of Africa seems to be under control, another "new" epidemic of the Zika virus is taking place in The Americas. The work (and needs) of the world go on and Christian Aid responds to each situation.

Christian Aid are also involved in campaigning world leaders regarding third world debt, climate change, tax evasion, oppression of the poor, speaking up for the many millions of poverty stricken people who otherwise would have no voice.



Stilton Statistics

Stilton Cheese, the King of English Cheeses takes its name from the Cambridgeshire village of the same name.

Apart from tasting delicious, here are some interesting facts about this cheese.

Colston Bassett Dairy, Cropwell Bishop, Long Clawson Dairy, Quenby Hall, Tuxford & Tebbutt Creamery and Websters are the only six dairies in the world licensed to make Blue and White Stilton cheese. So next time you buy some Stilton, check that they're from one of these six dairies.

Stilton is a trademark protected name cheese and both the Blue Stilton and White Stilton are covered under the EU Protected Destination of Origin (PDO) certification.

By law, Stilton can only be made in the three counties of Derbyshire, Leicestershire, and Nottinghamshire.

No one person invented Stilton – it evolved over time from its original pressed cream cheese to today's unpressed semi-hard blue veined cheese.

It takes 78 litres of milk to make one 8 kg round of Stilton cheese to the legally binding recipe.

Each cheese matures for 3 months after which the blue veins appear naturally as oxygen is allowed to enter through holes pierced by stainless steel needles.

Over 1 million rounds of Stilton cheeses are made each year.

More than 10% of Stilton output is exported to some 40 countries worldwide, which means that nearly 900,000 are consumed in the U.K. — that's a lot of blue cheese!

Every cheese is graded before leaving the dairy to ensure only Stilton cheese of the highest quality is marketed under the Stilton name.

White Stilton is made in a similar way to its blue cousin – except that no mould spores are added to the cheese.

White Stilton is sold at about 4 weeks of age. It is a crumbly, creamy, open textured cheese which is now extensively used as a base for blending with apricot, ginger and citrus or vine fruits to create unique dessert cheeses.

And finallyyou probably don't want to know that there are 410 calories per 100 gm of Stilton!

Sharon's Recipe - Vegetable Rice Salad with Tuna (Serves 4)

Ingredients

1 red pepper deseeded and chopped
1 yellow pepper deseeded and chopped
1 green pepper deseeded and chopped
1 medium red onion, peeled and chopped
1 small aubergine, chopped
1 tsp dried basil
2 tbsps balsamic vinegar
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
198g / 7 oz dried easy cook long grain and wild rice
200g / 4 oz cherry tomatoes, halved
185g can tuna in spring water, drained

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 220°C / Gas 7
2. On a large non-stick baking tray mix the peppers, red onion and aubergine. Add the basil and balsamic vinegar and season to taste. Cook on the top shelf of the oven for 10 minutes.
3. Remove from the oven and stir. Add the cherry tomatoes and continue to cook for another 10 minutes.
4. Meanwhile, cook the rice for 18 minutes in lightly salted boiling water and then drain.
5. Transfer the drained rice to a large bowl and mix in the cooked vegetables. Add the tuna.
6. Either serve straightaway or store in an air tight container until required. Keeps up to 48 hours in a fridge and makes a lovely lunchtime snack.

The first Sunday in May is Rogation Sunday. This is when many parishes still ‘beat the bounds’. Rogation means an asking of God - for blessing on the seed and land. The practice began with the Romans, who processed around the cornfields each Spring, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, in order to get rid of evil. About 465 AD the Western world was suffering from earthquake and storm. Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields. Thus ‘beating the bounds’ became a Christian ceremonial. It arrived in England early in the eighth century. Each Spring, led by the priest, a little party from the parish would set out with a Cross to trace the boundaries of the parish. They’d implore God to keep their corn and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to harvest. In the days when maps were scarce, ‘beating the bounds’ helped remind everyone just where the boundaries were. Do you know where yours are today?



A **crowd** gathered outside, they were all excited because each of them heard the believers speaking in their own language




